May 17th Celebration Moved Online to Zoom Live Gatherings on Hold due to COVID-19

Nordkap Lodge has cancelled its three upcoming live events due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the need to maintain social distancing for everyone's safety. The three events being cancelled at the Swedish Club are the lodge's April 26 gathering, the Norwegian Constitution Day celebration in May, and the Midsummer event on June 23.

However, **the celebration** of Norwegian Constitution Day will go forward as a virtual gathering, using the internet and the Zoom video conferencing app. You are invited to take part!

The virtual event will happen at 1 p.m. on Sunday, May 17, and last about an hour. Our May 17th chairperson, **Heather Vingsness**, will lead the video conference.

You will need a smartphone or a computer with a built-in camera and microphone-typically found on laptop computers—to join our video conference on the Zoom app.

Shortly before 1 p.m. May 17, go to the link:

https://uso4web.zoom.us/j/863549638. Then, if requested, enter the password "nordkap", all lower case. (For more detailed instructions, see the story on the next page.)

The timeline, as currently planned, includes the following:

1:00 - Everyone logs on and says "Hi"

1:05 - Virtual Parade (everyone marches around their house waving Norwegian flags, shouting "Hurra!")

1:10 - Singing of the Norwegian national anthem

1:15 - Welcoming message from Nordkap President Erik Duus

1:20 - Updates and news from Norway with **Dennis Flessland**, Honorary Consul of Norway to Michigan

1:30 - Bunads and updates from families - People can use the "raise my hand" button on Zoom to let us know they want to share or show off their bunads.

1:50 - Closing statements - families invited to make themselves a good Norwegian lunch of hot dogs and ice cream (preferably ice cream on a stick), and toss codfish (or maybe baseballs) in the comfort of their own homes

Go to https://uso4web.zoom.us/j/863549638 and enter the password nordkap, all lower case, OR

Go to <u>zoom.us/join</u> and type in the meeting ID 863549638 and enter the password nordkap, all lower case. The Zoom desktop program will download automatically when you join the call.

ON A SMARTPHONE:

Download the Zoom app from the App Store (if you have an Apple phone) or the Google Play Store (if you have an Android phone). Tap "Join a Meeting." You do not have to sign in.

Enter the meeting ID 863549638 and enter the password nordkap, all lower case.

Coronoavirus Concern Cancels Conventions, Youth Camp, Norsk Høstfest

The Fifth District Youth Camp, **Masse Moro**, was cancelled for 2020. The **International Norsk Høstfest** in Minot, North Dakota, was also cancelled. Both will return in 2021.

The Sons of Norway's District and International conventions were cancelled, as well. More on that from Fifth District President **Andy Johnsen**, who asked lodges in the District to carry the following message in their newsletters:

As of now, I am sure that most of the members of the District have received word that the 2020 Fifth District Convention/Meeting and the 2020 International Convention/Meeting have been

canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. There was a unanimous vote by the International Board of Directors to cancel the 2020 conventions/meetings. President Ron Stubbings has instructed all sons of Norway Officers, Directors, and Delegates to, "continue in service until the regular session lodge meetings of 2022." As members of Sons of Norway we need to follow President Stubbings' instruction in order to maintain our cohesiveness as a fraternal in this time of uncertainty.

As your District President I am requesting that all local lodge Presidents and Officers be prudent, and that they follow all State and Federal

government mandates concerning the COVID-19 virus. Be thoughtful and do not put yourself or any of your lodge members in any undue risk. Stay in touch with your other lodge members using the telephone and electronic means (conference calls or skype).

These are difficult times we are all experiencing. It is my hope that when this pandemic is over, the Sons of Norway will continue to be as strong and vibrant as ever.

It is with sadness that the Fifth District has lost one of its finest members, Gene Steensma, who passed away on March 25, 2020. Gene was a past Fifth District President, an International Director, and a long-time member and President of Samhold 5-473. Gene will always remain in the hearts of those who knew him. Keep Gene's family in your prayers as they go through their time of mourning.

In Memoriam: We honor the passing of:

--Eugene "Gene" E. Steensma (1940 – 2020), former president of Samhold Lodge, who passed away on March 25 at his new assisted living home in Waterford.

Gene was a native of North Dakota and graduated from Augustana University in Sioux Falls before beginning his 35-year career with John Morrell and Co. in the sales department.

He moved to Michigan in 1964 where he and his late wife Delores were very active in Gloria Dei Lutheran Church and the Sons of Norway.



Besides serving as president of Samhold Lodge for many years, Gene had also been president of the Sons of Norway's Fifth District and a Board member of the International Sons of Norway. He additionally had served as a governor on the Sons of Norway Foundation and was awarded the King Olav Medallion. He was awarded the Distinguished Service award by the Norwegian Consul in 1987. He was a member and, until recently, the secretary of the Norwegian Club of Detroit-- which awarded him a Distinguished Service Award.

With the merger of Samhold Lodge into Nordkap Lodge earlier this year, Gene transferred his Sons of Norway membership to the Fifth District's Central Lodge. Gene is survived by a stepdaughter,

stepson, 4 grand-children, 11 great-grandchildren, and two great, great grandchildren.

--Nordkap member Marjorie "Marge" D. Wiley (1927 – 2020), a longtime member of Samhold Lodge and its music director for several decades, who passed away on February 16.

A native of North Dakota, Marge helped keep watch from civil defense lookout towers as a teenager in North Dakota (reportedly never seeing much) and worked a summer in the circus riding elephants. She married John J. Wiley in 1947, eloping to Ostrander, Minnesota, and he preceded her in death on December 21, 2007.

Marge was a graduate of Michigan State and the University of Detroit. As a young mother, she taught piano and sang opera. She was an active and longtime member of Christ Lutheran Church in Waterford where she served as an organist and youth and bell choir director for over 50 years. She also taught vocal music in the Waterford School District.

Marge lived in Waterford for many years until her health required her to go into assisted living near her son in Chelsea, MI. Marge is survived by three children, five grandchildren, and six great grandchildren.

To honor Gene and Marge, Nordkap donated \$150 to our Scholarship Fund.

A Letter from President Erik Duus

Eighty years ago – on April 9, 1940 – Norwegians woke up to hear that Nazi Germany was invading their country.

Eighty years later, both Norwegians and Americans wake up to hear how the coronavirus (COVID-19) disease continues to invade their countries.

So far, more Americans have been killed by this "invisible enemy" than Norwegians who died as a result of World War II. Fortunately, national and local government leaders in both countries – and more importantly the citizens – realize that this is also like a "war" and drastic governmental and

individual actions are required to slow down – and eventually stop – the effects of this invasion.

Throughout most of my life, I have always known *some* of what both my parents had to endure throughout the war. I knew that my father had to go down to the bunkers in his German hometown while the Allies were bombing overhead. And I've heard many stories from my mom about her memories living in Nazi-occupied Norway.

I don't know that I've ever told anyone this, but I have always drawn a kind of inner strength from my parents' fortitude developed in the midst of pain, suffering, poverty, hunger, and even death. Because they still "lived life" in the midst of. And they did so, ironically, on opposite sides of that war.

So how then will we "live life" during this season? Personally, I am finding that I *need* to go outside more. Not just because going outside is a Norwegian thing to do, but also to go a couple hours in a row of <u>not</u> eating, snacking, or hanging out in front of the fridge!

A few days ago my mom and I went for a nice long walk at one of our wonderful Metroparks (metroparks.com). Again she reminded me that if we were in Norway, there would be many more people taking full advantage of such a park. Even considering that the entire country of Norway has only about a half million more people than Southeastern Michigan, we could still picture far more Norwegians spending the day in the park enjoying the outdoors.

So my "Executive Order" for all of you during this time is to be like a Norwegian and "GO OUTDOORS!" If that means cutting way back on the doom saying news, stretching out your Norwegian/Nordic Netflix shows over more time, or even going back to eating just three main meals per day, just do it!

In the meantime, may you and your family remain healthy and safe!

Scandinavian Photo Contest is Looking for Your Nordic Photos



Convention Postponed but Virtual Walk to Norway Continues

Due to the COVID-19 global pandemic, the Fifth District's virtual walk to Norway membership challenge which was to end on June 15 has been extended to December 15.

The objective is to track the actual miles you log from various sporting activities and go the virtual distance from your lodge to Minneapolis (where Sons of Norway was founded) and then to Ringsaker, Norway, where the International Convention was to have been held in August of this year.

The walk was designed for three purposes:

- 1) To promote fitness among our members
- 2) To provide an opportunity for our District to celebrate the 125th Anniversary of the Sons of Norway, as we headed toward the site of the 2020 International Convention (which was postponed until 2022 due to the pandemic).
- 3) To help provide some on-going support for Masse Moro, the 5th District's heritage camp.

Those goals continue with the extension of the walk. At the end of the challenge, participating lodges are asked to send a check for \$50 as their entry fee, unless individuals sought private sponsorship. With 48 lodges in the district, some \$2400 could be raised for Masse Moro.

Fun Facts about Norwegian Constitution Day

While you're celebrating May 17, here are some facts to consider about this special day when the Norwegian Constitution was signed:

- The Constitution signed and adopted in 1814 is the second oldest written Constitution in the world still in existence today.
- The document was inspired by the United States and French Constitutions.
- The delegates in this famous painting of the Constituent Assembly at Eidsvold by Oscar Wergeland are painted so well that about 70 of them can be identified.
- Fredrik Meltzer, a member of the constitutional assembly, designed the Norwegian flag in 1821. It incorporated red, white and blue from countries that Meltzer thought best symbolized liberty: the United States, the United Kingdom, and the Netherlands.




- The Constitution received a linguistic revision in 1903. While the overall language of the Constitution has essentially remained unaltered, the language from 1903 is still used when proposed changes are made.
- The first public 17th of May speech was given in Christiana (now Oslo) in 1833 by poet Henrik Wergeland.
- Today, two food staples of Norwegian Constitution Day are ice cream and hot dogs. It's widely believed that Norwegians consume more ice cream on May 17th than on any other day of the year.
