In Memoriam

Sadly, we experienced the death of another dear friend, Nordkap Life Member **Peggy Berntine Gjerpen**, who passed away on March 23 at the age of 97.

Peggy was born on August 31, 1924, in Highland Park, Michigan, where her Norwegian father was working at Ford Motor Company. The family subsequently returned to Norway and lived in Oslo.

As a young girl, Peggy caught the eye of her future husband,

Kaare Gjerpen, when they were both passengers on a ship headed from Norway to New York. They married in 1948.

Kaare had served in the Norwegian Merchant Marine during World War II. His service there was honored posthumously at Nordkap Lodge's membership gathering in October 2016 where Peggy received letters and special medals from the governments of the United States and Norway in recognition of the important role of Kaare and the Merchant Marine in supporting the war effort and defeating the Nazis. The presentation was made by the honorary Norwegian Consul from Norway to Michigan, Dennis Flessland.

Peggy and Kaare had four children, Eileen (Michael) Shea, Ann Gosney, Paul (Sherry), and the late Eric (Melody), plus five grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. Kaare died in 1978.

After her children were grown, Peggy worked for 25 years as a phone operator at Comerica Bank in downtown Detroit.

She was a member of Nordkap Lodge for nearly 55 years and was a proud supporter and volunteer at numerous lodge gatherings and events, along with her good friend, the late Christine Jurgensen. Always beautifully dressed, Peggy had a gentle manner, a kind word, and beautiful smile for everyone.

Burial was private.

To honor her memory, Nordkap has donated \$75 to the Nordkap Scholarship Fund in her name.

Festive Norwegian Constitution Day Celebration Set for May 14

The Swedish Club in Farmington Hills will again be the setting for Nordkap's festive celebration of Norwegian Constitution Day. This year marks the 208th anniversary of the Norwegian Constitution, signed in Eidsvoll, Norway, on the 17th of May 1814.

Nordkap traditionally celebrates the occasion on a weekend, so our festivities this year will be on Saturday, May 14, on the Swedish Club grounds at 22398 Ruth Street in Farmington Hills, Michigan.

The event will begin at 11 a.m. when the Swedish Club opens with Norwegian food imports and gift items for sale. You'll want to be there by 11:30 a.m. when the festive parade steps out with Scandinavian musicians and flag bearers leading the way (see photos below). We will be right behind, shouting "Hurra for Norway," waving Norwegian flags, and banging noisemakers. This is an event kids and grandkids will enjoy.

As they do in Norway for this national holiday, we will fly the Norwegian flag, sing the Norwegian national anthem, turn out in "bunads"—Norway's national dress—and hear greetings from Norway's honorary consul to Michigan, Dennis Flessland. Next, we'll enjoy Scandinavian music, picnic foods, and Norwegian heart waffles as we prepare for the games. A complimentary dessert and coffee buffet will follow the games.

Among the games, Nordkap's own Cod Toss Tournament will challenge contestants to throw frozen fish for distance. Winners will take home prizes--all with a "fishy" theme. There will also be special games like the Norwegian yard game of Kubb and activities for the children.

Admission for the event is \$5 payable at the door.

This includes pølse (hot dogs), chips, soft drinks, Norwegian heart waffles with jam and sour cream, and desserts. Please consider bringing a favorite Norwegian dessert to share at the dessert buffet.

You can also shop at our general store stocked with imported cheeses, lefse, herring, candy, books, and Norwegian flags. Events will continue until the closing time of 3 p.m.

Mary Morehead enlisted five journeyman bakers from her Norwegian Baking Classes to help her demonstrate how to make lefse, the traditional soft Norwegian flatbread.

The Nordkap event on Sunday, March 20, at the Swedish Club, served as a fundraiser for the lodge's scholarship fund. In all \$564 was raised for scholarships from donations and the sale of lefse.

The affair was a welcome social occasion after the long dormant period that came with the COVID-19 pandemic. After the demo, a variety of desserts were served and samples of freshly made lefse were passed, with toppings including cinnamon and sugar, lingonberry jam, and brunost cheese.

Join Nordkap's Next Nature Hike - Saturday, May 7th, at 9 a.m.

Come join Nordkap Lodge members and friends on Saturday, May 7th, at 9 a.m. to hike at Kensington Metropark, a 4,481-acre wonderland at 4570 Huron River Pkwy, Milford, Michigan. **We will meet at the Nature Center parking lot located inside the park.** Signs will direct you to the Nature Center or ask for directions at the entrance booth. Park hours are 6 a.m. – 10 p.m.

This is a great place to spot birds. We may be able to see the colony of Blue Herons at the rookery (the breeding colony that has a large collection of nests high up in the trees along the lake by the Nature Center). They start returning to their nests mid- to late-March each year, and hatchlings should start appearing 27-29 days after eggs are laid. Bring your camera and binoculars.

The fee to enter the park is covered in the 2022 Metropark pass, if you have one. Single day passes are \$10 per vehicle.

Earn Awards for Your Activities in this Sports Medal Program

As Norwegians, it's part of our heritage to be involved in outdoor activities and fitness. To honor this tradition, Sons of Norway offers Sports Medal Programs that all members can participate in.

There are five categories where medals can be earned.

- 1. Idrettsmerke General Fitness
- 2. Skimerke Skiing
- 3. Svommemerke Swimming
- 4. Sykkelmerke Biking
- 5. Gangmerke Walking

The different levels of medals that can be earned are

Bronze, **Silver**, **Gold**, **and Enamel**. Recently, Sons of Norway added two higher-level medals that can be earned after a member earns the Enamel level in a category.

The first of the new medals, **Idrettshelt** [*ee-dretts-hellt*]—the sports hero pin—is the 5th level within any sports medal category.

The second is **Hederspris** [hay-dersh-prees]—the outstanding sports achievement award. This pin is for members who've earned the bronze, silver, gold and enamel medals in each of any three sports medal categories.

Revised Nordkap Bylaws Require Approval by Lodge Members

At the direction of Sons of Norway international headquarters in Minneapolis, local lodges were asked to update their bylaws based on a common template provided by the international organization.

Accordingly, the Nordkap Board of Directors asked a committee comprised of Carmen Collins and Louise Giles to draft updated bylaws for our lodge. That task is complete, and the Nordkap Board approved the revised bylaws at its last meeting on March 30.

The next step is for Nordkap members to read the revised bylaws. A copy is included with this newsletter for that purpose. Please carefully read through the document, which adheres to the Sons of Norway template. Provisions specific to Nordkap are included in Section IX "Miscellaneous."

The lodge approval process then requires these steps: A copy of the bylaws will be distributed and read at our April meeting. At our May gathering, members present will be asked to vote to approve the bylaws. Once approved by a two-thirds vote of members present, the bylaws will be sent to Sons of Norway International for approval by their CEO and Legal Counsel.

Nordkap's bylaws were last revised in 2003 and contained several provisions that no longer applied to our lodge. This updated version eliminates those inconsistencies and reflects the consistent format mandated by Sons of Norway.

All college-bound students looking to qualify for a Nordkap scholarship should be preparing their applications now to meet our June 30 deadline.

Applicants please note: Your application must include two <u>current</u> letters of recommendation, meaning they must be written within the last year.
